The sky was replaced and the group agreed that it may not match the lighting on the boat. The very fun pelican perched on the boat was added and several did not notice it. It as noticed, subsequently that the shadow of the bird was well placed.

We all recognized the wrecked ship at the bottom and Doug was interest in the group discussing what they thought was done. There was considerable discussion regarding adding of the reflection and several members found fault with its addition, namely, the water added to the foreground and the ripple effect that did not seem accurate. It was thought that the image is beautiful and a short viewing might now even show any problem, as the discussion group had an infinite amount of time to look for something,.





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Bob Wheeler

Bob included two very interesting images with back stories. The glowing silhouette, which most felt was fire, was nothing more that the polluted sun shining through leaves with Bob's silhouette. It was agreed that this is a very interesting capture of the tricks in the mind and eye.

The second image of the bird feeder was discussed in the context of lighting and how it appeared to glow. The explanation became obvious with the story or how the sun's reflection of several surfaces was the culprit. Everyone thought it an interesting capture.

The fawn, Jan said, required quite a bit of manipulation, with the painterly effect provided by Topaz and she cloned in several flowers to provide symmetry. It was discussed that the background appeared well done however the green at the top seemed to be flat and not in keeping with the brown.

The geese was considered, by the group, to be

excellent. There was mention of the goose at the back as being out of place, but the group felt just the opposite and felt it just right. Consensus was that it is a fine capture with good animation.



John Craig

John shared one of his time-lapse sequences. This time he concentrated on the differences between shutter speeds and how that changes the look of the moving images. Everyone found a favorite look.

Ray presented two versions of the same image. One as it appeared as a JPG file right out of the camera, and the flowers in the second, totally manipulated in Adobe Camera Raw. He then went to Photoshop Elements and using select subject, selected the flowers so he might manipulate the background to remove distraction.

And even then I think the humor, as in much of our photography, resides in out own mind.


The second image was given as one that Jon knew was not a competitive image and despite that liked it as it is. There was much discussion about how it might be cropped for more success.
